O That Will Be Glory

This song came from the pen of Charles H. Gabriel, who was one of America's most prolific writers of gospel songs at the turn of the century. Charles had grown up in a musical family in Iowa, and his mother encouraged his musical inclinations. When Charles told her he was going to write a song that would one day be world-famous, she replied, "My boy, I would rather have you write a song that will help somebody than see you President of the United States."

Several decades later, in 1900, Charles, then 44, wrote a song inspired by his

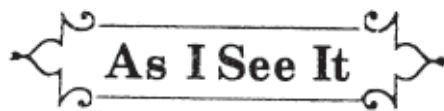
The Unknown Path

friend Ed Card, director of the Sunshine Rescue Mission in Saint Louis. Ed often punctuated his sermons with the word, "Glory!" and at the end of his prayers, he usually said, "And that will be glory for me!"

Using those expressions, Gabriel wrote, *O That Will Be Glory For Me*.

Not long afterward, this song came to the attention of the famous music director, Charles M. Alexander. Alexander and J. Wilbur Chapman had been the first men to entirely circle the globe holding evangelistic campaigns. He was a gifted, popular, and enthusiastic worship leader, beloved around the world. His blessing on a song could make it a "hit."

But when Alexander saw, *O That Will Be Glory*, he didn't think too highly of it. "That man has wasted a page for I do not believe that song will be sung much," he said to himself as he tossed it aside.

Several months later, Alexander attended a convention where "The Glory Song" was sung with great vivacity. It affected him so deeply that he was soon teaching it to his friends and co-workers. When he joined Dr. R. A. Torrey for a series of evangelistic rallies in Australia, this became their theme song.

Alexander was surprised to hear telephone operators and hotel maids singing this song, even workmen in the streets and executives in their offices. It was

translated into a myriad of languages. In Great Britain, it was sung again and again in Alexander's evangelistic rallies. Other evangelists such as Gipsy Smith caught on and started using it. It became enormously popular around the world, the most popular gospel song of its era.

And Charles Gabriel . . . well, he couldn't have been happier if he had been elected President of the United States.
